Research Briefs

The dissemination of relevant information is a critical component of the performance improvement process. Research briefs are one mechanism used by St. Petersburg College (SPC) for this purpose. Research Briefs are short publications prepared by the Department of Institutional Research and Effectiveness (IRE) that are intended to provide relevant important information regarding a variety of College-related topics. These topics include, but are not limited to, student achievement, state accountability measures, institutional survey results, student enrollment, and faculty/adjunct compensation.

Introduction

As in previous years, SPC has conducted a Recent Alumni Survey designed to measure alumni satisfaction with SPC's vocational programs. Specifically, the Recent Alumni Survey was designed to gain insight into alumni perceptions of the quality of career preparation, and determine the current activities of former students such as employment information and educational status. In addition, the data are collected for state required annual Placement & Follow-up Report and supplemental information to meet workforce criteria.

Respondents of the Recent Alumni Survey have included graduates from Associate in Arts (AA), Associate in Science/Associate in Applied Science (AS/AAS) and certificate programs (CT, ATC, PSAV, PSVC). In Fall 2002, SPC began offering Bachelor of Science (BS) and Bachelor of Applied Science (BAS) degrees. These technical programs focus on preparing students to enhance their skills, knowledge, reach higher levels of income, and increase personal and professional growth. Since Summer 2003, Bachelor degree graduates have been included in the Recent Alumni Survey process.

Data Collection

The Recent Alumni Survey was administered to 2005-06 program completers which included individuals who graduated from a Bachelor (BS, BAS), Associate (AA, AS, AAS), Certificate (CT, ATC, PSAV, PSVC) or Applied/Advanced (ATD) degree program. The graduates were first contacted by mail, and then followed up with phone calls to those who did not respond to the earlier mailings.

Recent Alumni Surveys were sent out to 3,756 program completers. There were 982 surveys returned for an overall response rate of 26.1%. It should be noted that this was the second year for an online survey to be included as part of the follow-up process with 231 graduates responding to the survey online. Table 1 summarizes the response rate by degree program.

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Results

This research brief focuses on the 982 graduates who responded to the survey. Nine hundred and sixty-five graduates (98.3%) responded to the question, "What was your main goal in completing a degree or certificate at SPC"? The majority of survey respondents (60.7%) indicated their main goal in completing a degree or certificate was to 'Continue my education'. This was followed by 16.3% selecting 'Change career fields', 8.2% selecting 'Earn more money', and 4.2% selecting 'Obtain employment'. Table 2 summarizes the item responses by type of degree awarded.

For the 959 graduates responding to the question, "Which of the following were you able to accomplish after obtaining your degree or certificate?" Six hundred eighty-one respondents (71.0%) indicated that their SPC degree allowed them to 'Continue my education'. This was followed by 24.4% indicating 'Earn more money', 18.7% indicating 'Change career fields' and 14.1% indicating 'Meet certification-training needs.' [Note: The total exceeded 100% because this question allowed multiple responses by survey respondents.]


Table 3 displays survey respondent satisfaction levels on the question "How well did SPC help you meet your above goal?" The majority of respondents (96.5%) indicated they were satisfied with the help they received from SPC in meeting their above goal(s). Almost half (47.6%) of survey respondents indicated that SPC did 'Very well' in helping them meet their goal, 37.9% indicated 'Exceptionally well', and 11.0% thought that SPC did 'Adequately' well.

When graduates were asked about their current employment status, almost three-quarters (72.9%) of the respondents were currently employed. Over one-half of those employed (59.5%) indicated that their current position was related to their educational field as shown in Figure 1. As expected, the completers of workforce degree programs (BS, BAS, AS, AAS, CT and ATD programs) reported higher field related employment levels (68.3% - 94.1%) than graduates of the AA program (39.7%). In addition to employment and education status, thirteen respondents indicated they were in active military service.

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For alumni employed, over half (53.9%) provided their wage per hour and one quarter (25.7%) reported annual earnings. Although the amounts earned varied by program, the most frequently reported wage per hour was between \$10.00 and \$12.49. The hourly wage for the AS graduates employed in a field related to their studies was higher than AA graduates. For those who reported annual income, the most frequently reported range was \$30,000 to \$39,999. Table 4 summarizes wage per hour and annual salary. Samples of job titles reported by graduates are shown in Table 5.

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Of the 968 survey respondents, two thirds (66.8%) reported that they were continuing their education. The majority of the AA graduates (84.2%) are continuing their education with most of those enrolled full-time (70.6%). One third (37.5%) of combined AS and Certificate completers are continuing their education, however, the majority of those are enrolled part-time. Over one quarter (25.8%) of the baccalaureate graduates are continuing their education. Tables 6 and 7 summarize continuing education and enrollment status by awarded SPC degree.

The majority of students are continuing their education in Florida. Table 8 displays the number of respondents who indicated that they are continuing their education at Florida state universities and colleges. Of the respondents furthering their education, over one-third are re-enrolling at SPC (36.2%), and an additional third are transferring to the University of South Florida (36.1%). Table 9 provides areas of study in which the 2005-06 graduates were enrolled.

The graduates' level of satisfaction in regards to how well SPC did in prepared them to continue their education is shown in Table 10. For those 647 graduates continuing their education, almost all (96.0%) responded to the question "How well did SPC prepare you for continuing your education?" Satisfaction levels were notable with 98.7% of the graduates indicating that their SPC studies prepared them 'at least' adequately to continue their education.

As shown in Table 11, eight hundred and ninety-eight respondents (96.6%) indicated they would recommend SPC to others.

Midway through the 2005-06 Recent Alumni survey administration process, the College began including additional survey questions to assess the graduates' level of satisfaction in areas of general education outcomes. Graduates were asked to rate their preparation of general education skill areas on a 7-point Likert scale.

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Based on the results, graduates felt SPC adequately prepared them in the majority of their general education skills areas as shown in Table 12. Two outcomes received mean scores of 6.0, 'Courses in your major area' and 'Life-long Learning', while the remaining eleven received mean scores between 5.4 and 5.9.

Conclusion

The results show that SPC programs are providing the needed training and education for students to obtain employment and continue their education.

Nearly three-quarters (72.9%) of graduates who responded are currently in the labor market and over one-half of those (59.5%) are employed in a field related to their studies. A majority of graduates employed earn an hourly wage higher than \$12.50 an hour or an annual salary of greater than \$30,000.

Over one-third of the respondents are continuing their education with the vast majority (95.1%) of those continuing their education within the State of Florida. SPC graduates also provided high satisfaction ratings in the areas of general education outcomes associated with the general education skills.
