SPC's first ROTC grad earns degree and commission in May



When Nicole Moore-Etheridge graduates with a baccalaureate degree in Public Safety Administration May 9, she will do so as the first person in SPC history to earn a military commission through the Reserve Officer Training Corps.

In the past, some two-year SPC students have been able to take part in ROTC programs through partnerships with other institutions that have ROTC programs. However, those students

would not earn their ROTC commissions until they completed a full four-year course of study, finishing up at some other college.

Moore-Etheridge wanted her ROTC commission in the U.S. Army Reserve to come through St. Petersburg College. But she was surprised to learn recently that she was making SPC history.

"I had no idea," Moore-Etheridge said. "My ROTC Major brought it up to me, and I was very excited. I know people graduated from SPC and went on to finish up elsewhere, but I am the very first to graduate from SPC and go straight through to earn an ROTC commission."

Moore-Etheridge, 24, followed a rather circuitous route to earn her mission. She is already a military veteran, and she is a single mother of a 7-year-old daughter.

"I started college when I was 19," she said. "I lived in Alabama, and I was married to a man who was in the service. I enlisted in the military, and I completed my basic training in 2006."

She then joined the Army Reserve, and moved back to her native St. Petersburg, enrolling at SPC. She earned an A.A. degree before pursuing a four-year degree while continuing to serve in the reserves.

It was then that she decided to join the ROTC program.

"I wanted to become a Lieutenant and a leader," she said. "I decided to do ROTC and get paid to go to school while serving my country. So that's what I did – I was in the ROTC program while working two jobs and going to school."

Moore-Etheridge was able to make it work by taking advantage of a partnership agreement involving several local colleges. The ROTC program she is enrolled in is based at the University of South Florida, but that program has partnership agreements with Eckerd College and Clearwater Christian College as well as SPC, according to Maj. Scott Macksam, Assistant Professor of Military Science and Leadership at USF's St. Petersburg campus.

"Nicole was in the Reserves, but she wanted to become a leader and an officer," Macksam said. "We have had SPC students who have transferred into the USF system, but she is the first to be commissioned with a degree from SPC. She will be commissioned as a 2nd Lieutenant in the Army Reserves as she graduates with a bachelor's degree in Public Safety Administration."

After graduation, Moore-Etheridge will complete six months of active duty training at Fort Benning in Georgia and Fort Jackson in South Carolina. After that, she said, she hopes to be placed on active duty as a Reservist. Moore-Etheridge will be commissioned May 1 at 3 p.m. during ceremonies at the Joint Military Leadership Center at the USF St. Petersburg campus.

ROTC is a college-based officer commissioning program, predominantly in the U.S. It is designed as a college elective that focuses on leadership development, problem solving, strategic planning and professional ethics.

Final weekend for SPC history exhibit

Calories and weight loss: How diet savvy are you?

Test your knowledge with our diet quiz.

How did you do?

The answer to question one is C - eating less and moving more.

A healthy approach to weight loss includes a daily intake of no less than 1,500 calories, regular physical activity, adequate sleep and stress management.

The answer to question two is A - true.

A healthy diet plan allows you to eat a variety of foods while maintaining energy balance. You should not starve yourself, but be wary of super-sized portions.

The answer to question three is **B** - false.

Diets that promise rapid weight loss can be dangerous and almost always result in you gaining that weight back. Rapid weight loss also means muscle loss too, which lowers your basal metabolism and should be avoided.

The answer to question four is A - true.

Fat has more than double the calories of protein and carbohydrates: Fat = 9 calories per gram; Carbohydrates = 4 calories per gram; Proteins = 4 calories per gram.

A recent study published in the Feb. 26 issue of the New England Journal of Medicine compared different diets with different compositions of fat, carbohydrates and proteins. It concluded that people lose weight if they lower calories, no matter what types or combinations of foods are consumed.

To sum it up:

Food intake = Output (activity and basal metabolism) = No change in weight Food intake > Output = weight gain Food intake < Output = weight loss



St. Petersburg College adds environmentally focused degree programs

In the fall, the college will begin offering an Associate of Science in Environmental Science Technology and a Bachelor of Applied Science in Sustainability Management.

"Environmental issues are no longer a fad, but rather a philosophy that is becoming part of the collective social conscious," said Jason Green, SPC's Sustainability Coordinator. "Now more than ever, the college has the opportunity to provide the leadership needed to train our community for the Green Collar' jobs of the future."

The Sustainability Management degree focuses on sustainable business and communication strategies, energy and resource management, legal aspects of sustainability, and sustainability in built and natural environments. It was developed by SPC's College of Technology and Management and is an extension of a Sustainability and Green Management track being offered as part of the Bachelor of Applied Science in Management and Organizational Leadership.

"This unique degree, developed in collaboration with local industry leaders and universities, is designed to help students understand the broad concept of systems and strategy involved in sustainability," said Shri Goyal, Dean of the College of Technology and Management.

The Environmental Science Technology degree includes three sub-plans: Water Resource Management, Environmental Resources/Energy Management and Sustainability.

"We believe this program will provide the practical applications and skills to support a wide range of existing and new 'green' careers, as well as being an initial step for those interested in moving on to the new SPC fouryear program," said Jim Olliver, Seminole Campus Provost.

In addition to those two new offerings, SPC offers a number of other environmentally-focused academic programs.

Sustainable construction practices and awareness have been incorporated into the Architectural Design and Construction Technology A.S. degree. Also, the College of Technology Management offers a Sustainability and Green Management track as part of the Bachelor of Applied Science in Management and Organizational Leadership. Green lodging has been introduced into the Hospitality A.S. degree curriculum, while an emphasis on sustainability has been incorporated into the Parks and Leisure Services program.Water conservation is studied within the Management Technology A.S. degree.
